

Letter from the Vicar

What do you want out of Christmas this year? Fun? Family get togethers? More presents than last year? A little bit of peace and quiet? And when does your Christmas begin? As I write this, some people have already got their Christmas tree up and the decorations out – why wait!

This year we have an election during Advent – we have all had to register to vote, which is not too dissimilar to the circumstances that led Mary and Joseph to travel to Bethlehem – only they didn't get to choose their country's leaders, just pay taxes to the Romans. Elections are serious events, we need to think deeply and prayerfully about how we vote, how we exercise that long-fought-for freedom and responsibility. The time leading up to that vote, and the weeks after it, will have an effect on our preparations for Christmas – it will be a political moment which will need to be surrounded with prayer, not sherry and carrots. This year's Christmas will not be like Christmases of former years – we need to be prepared.

Isn't Christmas a political event, anyway? God intervening directly in the life of his creation, living amongst us as one of his creatures is a political action, because it speaks of a God who experiences human life in all its pain and glory, a God who moves through this world and sees how human beings live together and organise their lives together in a broader society. When Luke tells the story of the baby Jesus being visited by shepherds, he wants his readers to understand that the God who lives amongst them cares for everyone in society, even those cut off from the normal run of things by their work or their lifestyle. Matthew brings the wise men to the baby Jesus to show that the whole world is included in the orbit of God's love.

So Christmas is about everybody – the homeless, the housebound, the children, the adults, the fit and the healthy as well as the sick and the vulnerable – everyone. And Christmas is about the whole of our planet, for Christ comes and walks through fields and woods and mountains and rivers, just as much as in streets and city squares.

If we are going to be responsible citizens and exercise our democratic rights to the full on 12th December, then we also need to be responsible citizens and open up our Christmas to the whole world, not just hug it to ourselves. The winter night shelters, in partnership with Glass Door and SPEAR are up and running again, and needed by more people than last year. Get in touch with me and we can explore ways of volunteering with the project. There are families across our borough for whom Christmas presents an insurmountable burden, and who will have to rely on foodbanks to feed their family through the festive season. Again, we will be sharing in a partnership with the local authority to provide Christmas presents for struggling families – go to any of the Kew churches and pick up an Advent Angel to make a difference locally. What are your neighbours doing this year? Will any be on their own? Make Christmas special for them, take the first step, go to them rather than wait for them to ask.

And most of all, seek out the presence of God in worship, in song, in prayer, in storytelling, in drama, in silence as well as in a lot of noise – God's love for his creation is as strong and effective now as it was those years ago when Jesus was born.




RICHARD WRIGHT

Richard deserves a long-service award. For nearly twenty years he has been the Booking Manager for the Barn Church and Hall, quietly, effectively and efficiently making sure the business of allowing events to take place in these venues runs seamlessly, making people want to use the church or hall again and again.

Concerts, talks, theatre group rehearsals, Mary Noyes' musical events, a film or a jazz evening, or the occasional funeral service brings in much needed income for the church. Over the years Richard has been there to open the church, help set up, raise and ensure invoices are paid and provide a friendly, reliable service. He will help with the sound system and microphones required in any of the events, and loves getting to know the different people engaged in different activities. Recently he has been involved in the installation of the new boiler ensuring all of us are warm enough in the coming winter months.



Bi-Media Sound Operations, News & Current Affairs, and become a house-husband.



Leaving school at sixteen he worked in civil engineering as a trainee site agent until lay-offs from his company during the exceptionally cold winter of 1963 made him apply and be accepted as a trainee Technical Operator in radio sound at the BBC. He was to be at the BBC for thirty seven years, largely working in radio. He became a Studio Manager and then Senior Studio Manager working on programmes such as Today, The World at One and PM.

It is the role of the Studio Manager to ensure the signal leaving the studio is balanced and appropriately loud or soft as the broadcast is happening. These are news programmes and some of the pieces will be pre-recorded but most of the interviews are *live* which requires sang froid! The Studio Manager sits at the Sound Desk with a second-by-second running order which may suddenly change and require instant and precise fading in or out. At World at One, for example, a pre-recorded interview may have to be cut or a live one extended. The Studio Manager has to keep a cool head, the Studio Presenter a steady voice to cope with the alteration.

At the forthcoming election, the Barn Church will become a polling station for the day. In 1983 Richard was the Senior Studio Manager working with Brian Redhead on election night from 11pm to 6.30am, which must bring it all back, although in such different times! It was soon after that Richard was promoted to management responsible for scheduling staff working in studios and organising the number of studios. When John Birt became DG of the BBC he made News and Current Affairs into a combined Radio and TV service and Richard was given the job of Head of Bi-Media Sound Operations, a prestigious role proving that he was at the top of his game.

Since retirement Richard likes to keep his hand in making recordings. He has made an organ CD for both Alban Clarke and Carl Dorman as well as one for a local Blues Band. His modest, warm presence feels part of the church and something we couldn't be without. He is what helps makes the Barn the place we love.



At the Barn the whole congregation is extremely grateful to the **Richmond Parish Lands Charity** for a generous grant which has paid for the complete refurbishment of the ladies toilets in the church hall. which include a compartment with a lower door and lower basins for children. It has also paid for a significant part of the cost of a new boiler to heat the church itself: the old one finally ceased to work in the spring. The boiler installation was complicated and required a new flue and extensive new brass pipework, and thanks go in particular to Richard Wright and Matt Pannett for all their sterling efforts to get the work completed on time. Nursery manager Susie Hancock also worked closely with church wardens Andrew Rankin and Beth Elliott and is delighted by the results and grateful to all the community who fund-raise and attend the church events, making these important updates to the facilities possible. Susie said "the nursery children are enjoying safer, cleaner more modern facilities to encourage and facilitate independent health and self-care, and are especially fascinated by the infra-red 'magic' sensor taps!"

Kew Sparkle arrangements are now well underway. Schools are planning their part in our "Kew Kids for Kew Christmas Lights", where the kids wear a Christmas jumper to school and bring along a donation. The school choirs are already rehearsing their songs. The Kew traders are also assembling fabulous raffle prizes for the evening and making generous contributions to the Christmas lights too.

CHOSEN CHARITY: Each year, Kew Sparkle raises between £2000-£3000 for a local cause, and this year the Committee has chosen the **Vineyard Community Centre**, a registered charity that specialises in helping meet the needs of the most vulnerable and destitute in the local community. Guests using their services are mostly homeless, living in poverty or socially isolated as a consequence of family breakdown, unemployment or addictions. The **VCC** provides a "morning drop-in" to those in crisis, a community nursing service, a food bank with five satellites, a cafe which welcomes those who experience social exclusion and a charity shop. The funds from the raffle and any profit raised on the night will be donated to the **Vineyard Community Centre**.




Kew for You

It may be winter but Kew Gardens has a wide range of ongoing activities and tours to appreciate the gardens at this time of year.

Kew Discovery and Access: this offers learning opportunities for visitors with limited mobility, additional or sensory loss. Regular accessible learning events include guided tours for deaf BSL users, health walks for visitors with sight loss and out of hours events for visitors with autism.

Kew Sensory Trail Sound: this includes the Woodland Garden, the Rock Garden, the Davies Alpine House, the Secluded Garden, the Hive and the Great Broad Walk Borders.

Kew Guided Tours: We are fortunate in Kew



Gardens to have free daily walking tours which provide an introduction to the Gardens, Kew Science Collections and History.

<u>Private Walking Tours:</u> I really enjoyed it when a group of my friends had a private walking tour in Kew Gardens. Bespoke tours for individuals or groups can be arranged and payment is essential and required six weeks in advance. Standard entrance fees apply. To book private tours email <u>tours@kew.org</u>. For free tours visit the Kew Gardens website – Visit Kew.

<u>Explore the Temperate House</u>: this is the world's largest surviving Victorian glasshouse. It's home for some of the rarest plants in the world that can be found growing in temperate zones. Never too hot nor too cold, temperate zones have definite changes in seasons throughout the year, as we have.

<u>Kew Youth Programmes:</u> (14 to 17 years): a bespoke training programme to equip selected young people to volunteer as expert explainers in the Temperate House. Youth Forum: (16 to 18 years) a group of young people who help to design and run specialist learning events in Kew, using science and arts to engage audiences.

<u>Youth Outreach Projects:</u> they work in partnership to engage young people who might not otherwise be able to access exciting learning opportunities. To find out more about partnership work, email youth@kew.org.

<u>Marianne North Gallery:</u> I have always been interested in learning about Marianne North. She played an important role in Victorian Society as a female explorer, plant hunter and artist. Her gallery was opened in Kew in 1886 and the contribution of women in scientific research continues to grow, I am pleased to say.

<u>Coming Events:</u> I am delighted to say that you can now stop and admire the Shirley Sherwood Collection, which re-opened on 16th November (until 15th March 2020), with amazing paintings from across the world.

Simone Webster writes:

Last year you kindly ran a piece in the Link about our search for homes for Syrian refugee families in Richmond. I am delighted to report that as a result of our publicity campaign, three further private-let properties in different areas of the borough were offered, bringing the total number of families resettled in Richmond to six. Altogether 12 adults and 15 children have now been able to escape the trauma of the refugee camps on the borders of Syria to find sanctuary in our borough under the VPRS scheme.

It has been wonderful to see how our original three families have rallied round to welcome the three new families, offering practical support and friendship as well as comforting home-cooked Syrian food and hospitality. When one of the new families couldn't get their boiler to work over the Easter bank holiday, our first

family went straight round and helped them to get it started. The latest house offered was in dire need of renovation, and the father of one of the original families, a painter-decorator by trade, insisted on offering his services free. A team of local volunteers, including a group of six-formers from a local School, worked tirelessly alongside the landlord to renovate the house and garden.

Two of the latest properties were offered unfurnished, and following a request on Facebook, Refugees Welcome in Richmond were inundated with generous offers of furniture and household equipment from local people. One couple who were downsizing offered a whole houseful of beautiful, good quality furniture. Through the donations and efforts of local people, the properties have been transformed into comfortable, well-equipped family homes.

When they first arrive, the families are met at the airport by a Council liaison officer, who is responsible for introducing them to their new home and neighbourhood and providing the intensive practical support they need initially as new arrivals. As well as helping source and prepare homes, Refugees Welcome in Richmond



volunteers also offer practical support to the families when they arrive, providing practice in spoken English and sourcing additional items the family might need, for example we have recently supplied a food processor for preparing baby food, warm children's clothes and toys. RWinR also organises events like picnics, tea-parties and drop-in coffee mornings to promote integration within the community.

While our three latest families were being resettled, the Council called a halt to the search for new properties so we could focus on meeting the immediate needs of the new arrivals. However, the search is now resuming and the Council has asked for RWinR's help to look for more properties. An excellent package of benefits is available for landlords participating in the scheme (a refugee family can only be accepted for this scheme by the Home Office if a home is available for them):

- Rent and council tax is paid starting immediately the property is available, and is paid direct to the landlord rather than through benefits;
- An upfront incentive payment (£2500-£3500 depending on size, plus equivalent of 6 weeks rent)
- No letting fees if dealing direct with the Council
- Standard Assured Shorthand Tenancy Agreements of 2-5 years, with the Council as guarantor;
- No obligations beyond those of normal property maintenance, as the family receives full support from the Council Resettlement Team


